Blyth Progress Association; organises community social events, community publications/newsletter, develop community ideas/infrastructure, preserves town history.


Committee is elected at September AGM each year.

Bryce Eldredge's Anzac Day Address.

I had an entirely different speech prepared for this morning. It was a nice reading about the sacrifice of men and women from conflicts of the past.

But somehow, that speech just didn't feel right, given our own hardships during the pandemic of the last couple of years, the Russian

invasion of Ukraine and the near peer international tensions, so I kept writing my thoughts until the early hours of this morning.

When I was growing up and in my early 20's I was fortunate enough to travel the world. And as I saw the consequences of conflict and the destruction it brings —I came to the hard truth that we as individuals can't just do nothing. Each and every one of us can do small acts to help make this a better world.

If we are going to save the world from pandemics, war, poverty, racism, extremism, intolerance— then we have to know our past to understand our future.

And given today's significance, looking at the spirit of the ANZAC's and the qualities Australian men and women from past conflicts is a great place to start.

First, to make the world a better place we must have courage. WW1 Australian General Sir John Monash once said that courage was the most important quality of all because it guaranteed all the rest. He was not just talking about the physical courage to charge the hill, run into a burning building, or stop a madman with a gun. He was also talking about moral courage. The courage to stand up for your convictions. Physical courage has long been the hallmark of a great soldier, but I would offer that the moral courage to stand up for what's right has an equal place.

If we hope to make the world a better place we have to standby our convictions. Just like the men on the Kokoda track, who stood up to the advancing Japanese Empire, we have to challenge the zealots with reason. We have to confront the ignorant with facts. And there will always be those who don't want to hear your convictions. Particularly if they are true.

Speaking the truth can be dangerous at times. Like WW2 Special Agent Nancy Wake, code named the White Mouse, who having witnessed the brutality of the Nazi regime first hand as a journalist, left

Sydney to join the French Resitance as one of Churchill's Top Secret Special Operations Executives. Nancy helped seek the truth in the chaos of war and by the end of 1945 she was credited with saving hundreds of lives through providing truthful information back to the Ally's.

People like Nancy, those tellers of truth, helped make the world a more knowledgeable place, a more compassionate place, a more human and livable place. If we are going to make the world a better place, we will need to seek the truth like Nancy. If we are going to make the world a better place we must persevere through the difficult times.

Life as an ANZAC soldier in the Somme was all about perseverance. They made it through year's of family separations, exhausting trench warfare, the

emotional loss of mates in combat. Sometimes making the world a better place is just about holding on. Never quitting no matter what obstacles face us.


To make the world a better place, we must have compassion. Like Simpson and his Donkey on the beaches of ANZAC cove we must fear for the vulnerable. We must pray for those who are without hope. We must be kind to the less fortunate. For what hero gives so much of themselves, without caring for those they are trying to save.

Finally, If we are going to make the world a better place, we will need to be humble. Sharing a piece of my own experience, I found in my time in the military, that no experience on earth is more humbling than the first someone shoots at you. Working in a country in conflict teaches you that you are not invincible—that like in my case, the enemy, with his bare feet and ragged robes, can point an old Kalashnikov Rifle to the sky and could sometimes get lucky in damaging the aircraft and endangering the lives of all the airmen inside.

And it's moments like that make you think... If you do not approach the world with humility, it will find a way to humble you quickly.

Making the world a better place is up to each and every one of us. So let's each everyday use Monash's words of Courage. Stand by our convictions like the men on the Kokoda track. Seek the Truth like Special Agent Nancy Wake. Persevere like the ANZAC's in the Somme and be humble. It is up to each of us. As you leave this service this morning, remember the spirit of the ANZAC's and the qualities of the brave men and women from all wars who made the ultimate sacrifice. And do whatever you need to do to make the world a better place.

Gus Dejong Eulogy

Gysbert was born in Dordrecht, Holland on 21st September 1942. He was later joined by siblings Wilhelmina and Jacob. In 1952 they sailed on the ship The Fairsea with their parents Cornelius and Margaretha to Melbourne to start a new life. We are told that our Opa Cornelius, who didn't speak English, hitchhiked to the small country town of Georgetown, South Australia where he found work with a local builder. Oma Margaretha and the three children stayed in a migrant camp in Melbourne waiting for him. Oma became quite ill during this time and while she spent some time in hospital the children were well looked after by some local nuns.

When the family arrived at Georgetown the children attended the local primary school and this is how they all learnt to speak English. After a few years Gysbert decided his name was way too complicated for the poor Aussies so changed it to Gus.

In the same year level at school as Gysbert was a cutie named Julia Crawford. At age 12 he asked one of his friends Fritzy Smallacombe to ask Julia if she would be Gysberts girlfriend. The reply was a blunt NO and she then had to wait a further 10 years for him to ask her out again. Amongst other things he was quite captivated by Julia's long slim legs and in later years he often reminisced how she looked in her VERY short engagement and going away dresses. Gus and Julia were married in the Georgetown Baptist Church on 12th April 1969 and they have been inseparable ever since. Coincidentally this date is also the anniversary of the passing of our dear Nicole.

Dad started his working life on a chicken farm before joining his Dad to work for a local farmer at Georgetown. Farming life certainly changed significantly during the years he was involved. We have a very early photograph of him sitting on a header with an umbrella for shade. A vast contrast to the header he drove at the end of his farming career.

In 1979, now with daughters Nina, Rachael, Nicole and Sarina in tow, our family moved from Georgetown to a property near Farrell Flat as Dad had won the managers position there. We never asked Dad if he liked the job or not, we were just happy living in a magnificent homestead, with a designated 'dancing/ singing room', creeks, climbing trees, motorbikes, pets and so much freedom to roam, play and have fun. We had a constant stream of visitors - Mum & Dad were great hosts! There was always an abundance of food and plenty of laughs available. Dad stayed in this job for about 20 years before deciding his farming days were over and a new forever home was built at Blyth. This new home soon welcomed a stream of family and friends and of course it didn't take long for him and his green fingers to get the garden established and blooming. Over the years the deJong family has slowly multiplied. Four son in laws joined the crew, then ten precious grandchildren - 5 boys and 5 girls. A whole new generation for Dad to tease and tell tall stories to! And a whole new generation of head scratchers...

At the end of Dad's farming life he decided to become a celebrant. He married each of us four girls and performed many other wedding ceremonies and funerals, always with the intention of making a difference in someone else's life. Dad was Mr DIY. Before Mum & Dad were married he spent many hours constructing furniture for their house, from bedroom furniture to the lounge suite, to enormous speakers for his record player which are still in use today and must be played loudly! In recent years he had a fascination with building model ships. His chunky fingers were not always ideal for putting together tiny fiddly pieces but he was persistent and spent many hours perfecting them.

After his family and the church Dad's greatest love was his garden. In each house he lived in the first plants to go in were fruit trees and a veggie patch. Consequently Mum has spent many hours creating jams, preserves, stewed fruit etc and there has always been a freezer full of produce to hand out to anyone who called in for a meal or to say hi.

For a small guy Dad was always the winner at the 'all you can eat buffet'. We don't know where he put it but he could certainly eat, and never put on an ounce! He loved having his head scratched.

The four of us daughters spent many hours doing this, mostly unwillingly, always with the promise of a 1 million dollar payment which to date has never been paid. We hope you have a good savings acc Dad, because you've incurred a very large debt!

As much as he loved having his head scratched he HATED having his feet tickled. This was always a good payback option if he was teasing us. Three of us would sit on him and one would tickle his feet. Although it was Nicole who always weakened and would end up helping him. Dad was a great sleeper. After a meal he could be found in his chair, on the floor, anywhere, having a nap before heading off to his next task for the day. We could walk over him, yell and squeal and go about our daily living and he wouldn't stir. The grandchildren thought this was hilarious and would often line up next to him on the floor. Reading was another great love. As a child when his family first moved to Georgetown Dad managed to put a single bed up in a tree near their farmhouse so he could climb up and read his books in peace.

Cooking certainly wasn't Dad's forte. We remember as kids when Mum was in hospital at one stage we had leftover apple pie for breakfast and lunch orders for school. This must've been a huge treat as we still remember it. I don't think Mum was very welcome when she came home from the hospital – no more apple pie for breakfast. Sorry Mum!
